5. Is it possible to have a funeral service/viewing of the body prior to donation?

10. What happens to the body once you have completed the study or research?

If the family does not have specific burial plans, McGill offers a general cremation service, after which the ashes are buried in a site reserved for the University at Mount Royal Cemetery in Montreal. In this case, all burial expenses are incurred by McGill University. Should the family wish that the ashes be returned to them, the University must be notified in writing within 2 weeks of the person's death. In this case, the family will be notified upon completion of studies and may make arrangements to retrieve the ashes in person at the funeral home (administrative fees of \$150 will apply).

Please note that if the family has been contacted by the University but has not responded with confirmation indicating their choice regarding ashes/burial within a period of three months following the date of death, for administrative reasons the file will automatically be marked for burial at Mount Royal Cemetery and cannot be changed.
